We believe that our collective experience teaching in-house clinics and engaging in national service—we have attempted to summarize that experience below provides a strong foundation upon which we intend to continue serving CLEA and the tremendous community for which it advocates.

Gautam began his clinical teaching career as a clinical fellow at the University of Michigan Law School, before joining the Vanderbilt Law School faculty in 2018 to launch a new First Amendment Clinic.

Since joining the CLEA community, he has endeavored to promote social justice, equity, and critical analysis of the role of experiential faculty in the legal academy, amidst the larger societal challenges for public interest lawyers. In his clinic, students work on cases involving free speech, press, and association issues, as well as their intersection with racial justice, political activism, and criminal law. His scholarship focuses on two main topics: doctrinal underpinnings in technology, speech, and privacy law; and structural questions about the pathways to clinical teaching. A frequent speaker on technology and speech issues, he presents on topics relating to DEI in legal education, technology and civil rights, and current issues in free speech law at conferences and symposia. In addition to his CLEA board service as co-chair of the Faculty Equity & Inclusion Committee, former co-chair of the Membership Committee, and member of the Advocacy and Membership Committees, he also serves as a CSALE Board Member, an advisory board member of the Initiative for a Representative First Amendment, and a non-resident Fellow at the Center for Democracy & Technology. He currently serves as a member of the planning committee for the 2022 AALS Annual Conference on Clinical Legal Education. • Lynnise has just started her 11th year of Clinical teaching – the first four at New York Law School, three years at Boston College Law School and three years at Columbia Law School, where she currently teaches the Entrepreneurship & Community Development Clinic. She has enjoyed being a part of the clinical community since she attended her first clinical conference in Puerto Rico in 2012. Since then, the community has continued to grow and we have witnessed the dynamic changes happening with respect to our role in the legal academy as well as our role outside the academy pursuing justice in these challenging times.

She has written about teaching transactional skills, the role of social and economic justice in transactional clinics, and how the racial wealth gap affects diversity and inclusion in the economic ecosystem. At national and regional conferences, she has been a regular conference presenter on topics relating to clinical teaching and pedagogy. In addition to her service on the CLEA board, most recently as co-chair of the Faculty Equity & Inclusion Committee and as former chair of the Elections

Committee, she has been active as an organizer of the annual transactional clinical conferences (2018) and she just finished a stint as co-chair of the transactional clinics committee of the Clinical Section of AALS. Additionally, she has served on the planning committee for the 2020 (and 2021) AALS Annual Conference on Clinical Legal Education. Andy Budzinski University of the District of Columbia David A. Clarke School of Law



I am excited for the chance to join the CLEA Board as a new clinician. I am eager to take a greater role in supporting the clinical community, advocating on issues that advance access to the profession, and continuing to promote the value of experiential learning. I was inspired by CLEA's timely and thoughtful addition to ABA Standard 303(c) requiring training and education on antiracism in law school education, and particularly the recommendations geared toward guided instruction and evaluation that can fundamentally shift how law students engage in antiracist lawyering. I want to continue that advocacy, in substance and form; to responding to critical moments in legal education as they arise; and to building a strong case for needed change. I share CLEA's commitment to access to the profession—both for our students seeking to become new lawyers, and within the clinical teaching community itself. There is important work yet to be done in surfacing and remedying inequities in our profession, explored in depth by the Diversity Committee's recent report. I am committed to doing and supporting that work. I also hope to add my perspective as an openly gay law teacher, and to explore how our community can expand its support for LGBTQ+ faculty and students.

Over the past five years, I have valued the resources made available through institutions like CLEA – support for new teachers looking for guidance, an open dialogue about growth and values in the clinical community, and rigorous advocacy in the field of legal education. I want to contribute to the already-robust programming and resources designed to support those who are just starting their teaching careers. I currently co-facilitate the Mid-Atlantic Clinicians Writing Workshop, which provides a welcoming space for newer clinicians to present their scholarship and receive feedback from colleagues from other schools. I would welcome the chance to facilitate collaborative opportunities like this for new clinicians across the country, not just on scholarship but on issues of student supervision, classroom teaching, and ways to advance our shared commitment to social justice.

I left the clinical teaching world so that I could immerse myself in legal aid practice and develop my own skills. Along the way, I launched a Gender Based Violence and the Law Clinic at the University of Chicago, where I taught students an interdisciplinary and holistic approach to meeting the diverse legal needs of abuse survivors.

I am also committed to working with students from traditionally underrepresented backgrounds and promoting social justice. This is evidenced in my roles as the faculty advisor for the Black Law Student Association (BLSA) and the founding advisor for the First-Generation Law Student Association (FGLSA) at Santa Clara Law, as a Board Member on the Advisory Committee for the Institute of the Advancement of the American Legal System (IAALS), and in my newly developed module on cultural competence that I will deliver at the Professional Development Institute (PDI) Conference in Washington D.C. in December 2021.


